3. *The Ganges Africans who were held at the Lazaretto station (Tinicum) in 1800*. <http://www.ushistory.org/laz/history/ganges.htm> . Mistakenly indicates the Ganges Africans arrived at the Lazaretto in Tinicum Twp. They actually arrived at the "Old Lazaretto", about a mile north of Fort Mifflin near the confluence of the Schuylkill and Delaware Rivers. The site is currently used by the Corps of Engineers for storing dredge spoil. No visible sign of the building remains.
